MONTGOMERY COUNTY COVID-19 UPDATE

MONTGOMERY COUNTY – Montgomery County Public Health District, in conjunction with the Montgomery County Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, would like to encourage residents to take advantage of mass vaccinations happening now in our county.

If you would like to make an appointment through MCPHD for Monday, May 3rd, please click here: <u>mcphd-tx.org</u>. Vaccines will be administered at Woodforest Stadium in Shenandoah.

Also, other providers, including St. Luke's and Lone Star Family Health Center, are offering first and second doses at Woodforest Stadium every day this week. If you have questions, please call the Montgomery County COVID-19 Call Center at 936-523-3916. The call center is available Monday - Thursday from 8:00am - 4:30pm or Friday from 8:00 - 4:00pm.

Lone Star Family Health Center, individual hospitals, physicians' offices, and pharmacies also have vaccines available for all adults. Today, we can sadly confirm five additional deaths related to COVID-19.

- A man in his 30s, from New Caney, died in the hospital. He had co-morbidities in addition to testing positive for COVID-19.
- A man in his 60s, from Splendora, died in the hospital. There were no co-morbidities noted in his medical records.
- A woman in her 60s, from New Caney, died in hospice care. She had co-morbidities in addition to testing positive for COVID-19.
- A man in his 70s, from New Caney, died in the hospital. He had co-morbidities in addition to testing positive for COVID-19.
- A woman in her 90s, from Montgomery, died in hospice care. She had co-morbidities in addition to testing positive for COVID-19.

We offer our condolences to all the families at this difficult time.

We can also confirm:

- TOTAL cases of COVID-19 increased by 241 to 52,540 since Thursday's (4/29) report. Of the 241 new cases, 236 were tested since 4/15/2021.
- ACTIVE cases of COVID-19 decreased by 17 to 1,578 since Thursday's (4/29) report. On Tuesdays and Fridays, we account for additional inactive cases who we have been unable to contact for 30 days or more. Today, we added 134 inactive cases.
- 107 county residents are known, as a result of contact investigations, to be in the hospital. Contact investigations have not been initiated on all reported cases.
- 27,702 people have clinically recovered.

The Testing Positivity Rate for Montgomery County remains at 8% for the 3rd week in a row. This number is updated weekly on Wednesdays.


