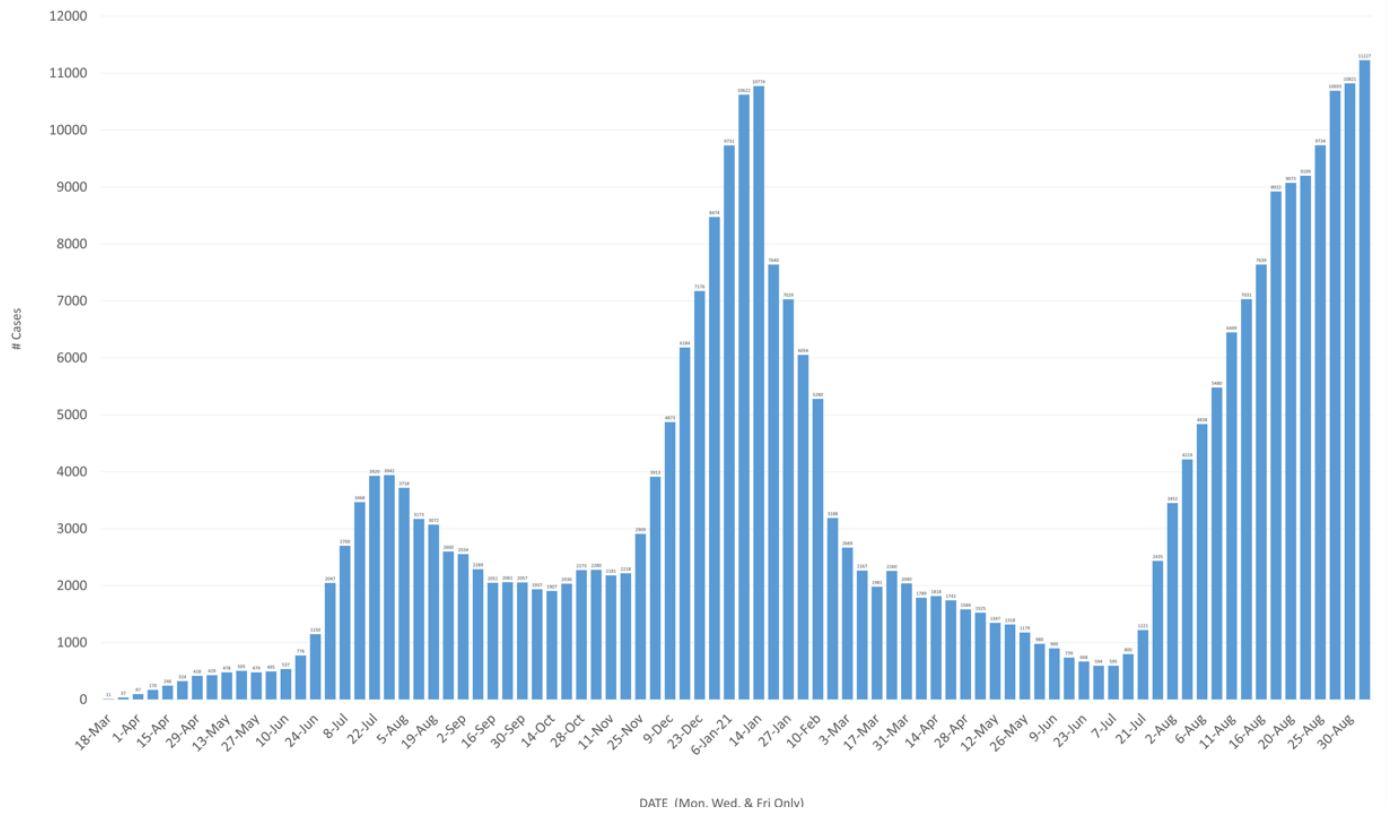
MONTGOMERY COUNTY COVID-19 UPDATE

MONTGOMERY COUNTY – Montgomery County Public Health District, in conjunction with the Montgomery County Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, can sadly confirm a record-breaking day related to COVID-19 in Montgomery County.

Today, MCPHD marked:

- 1.) A new all-time high of **active** COVID-19 cases.
- 2.) A new all-time high of **ICU patients** with COVID-19.
- 3.) A new all-time high of COVID-19 cases in **children** (ages 0-11).

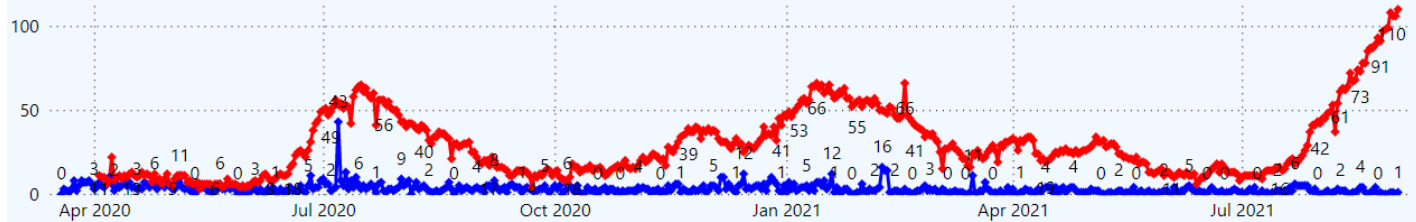

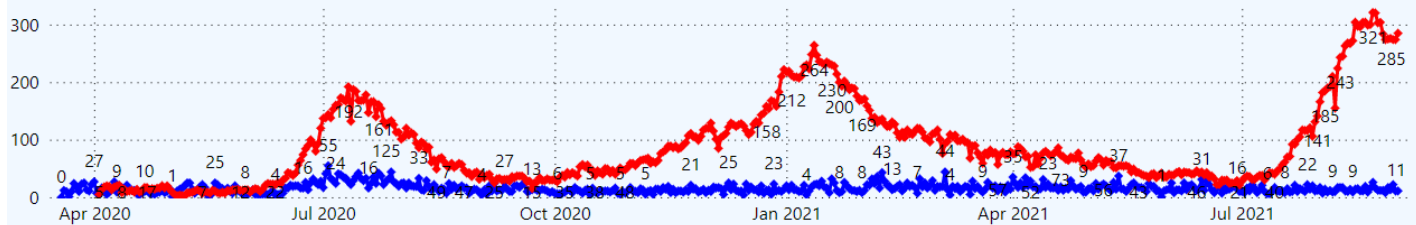
Suspected/Confirmed COVID Cases in ICU Beds

◆ Suspected COVID in ICU ◆ Confirmed COVID in ICU



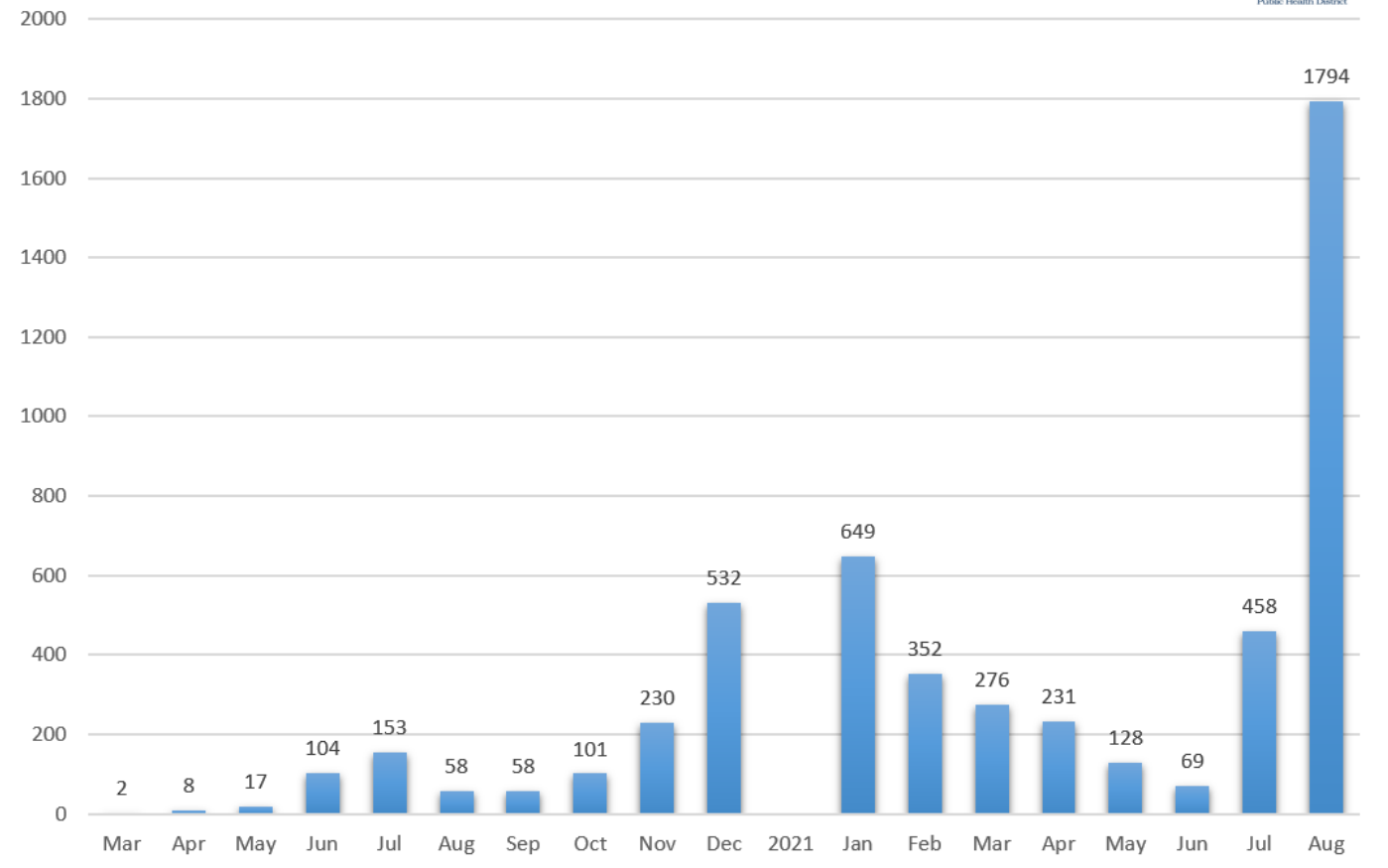
Suspected/Confirmed COVID Cases in General/Isolation Beds

◆ Suspected COVID in Gen/Iso ◆ Confirmed COVID in Gen/Iso

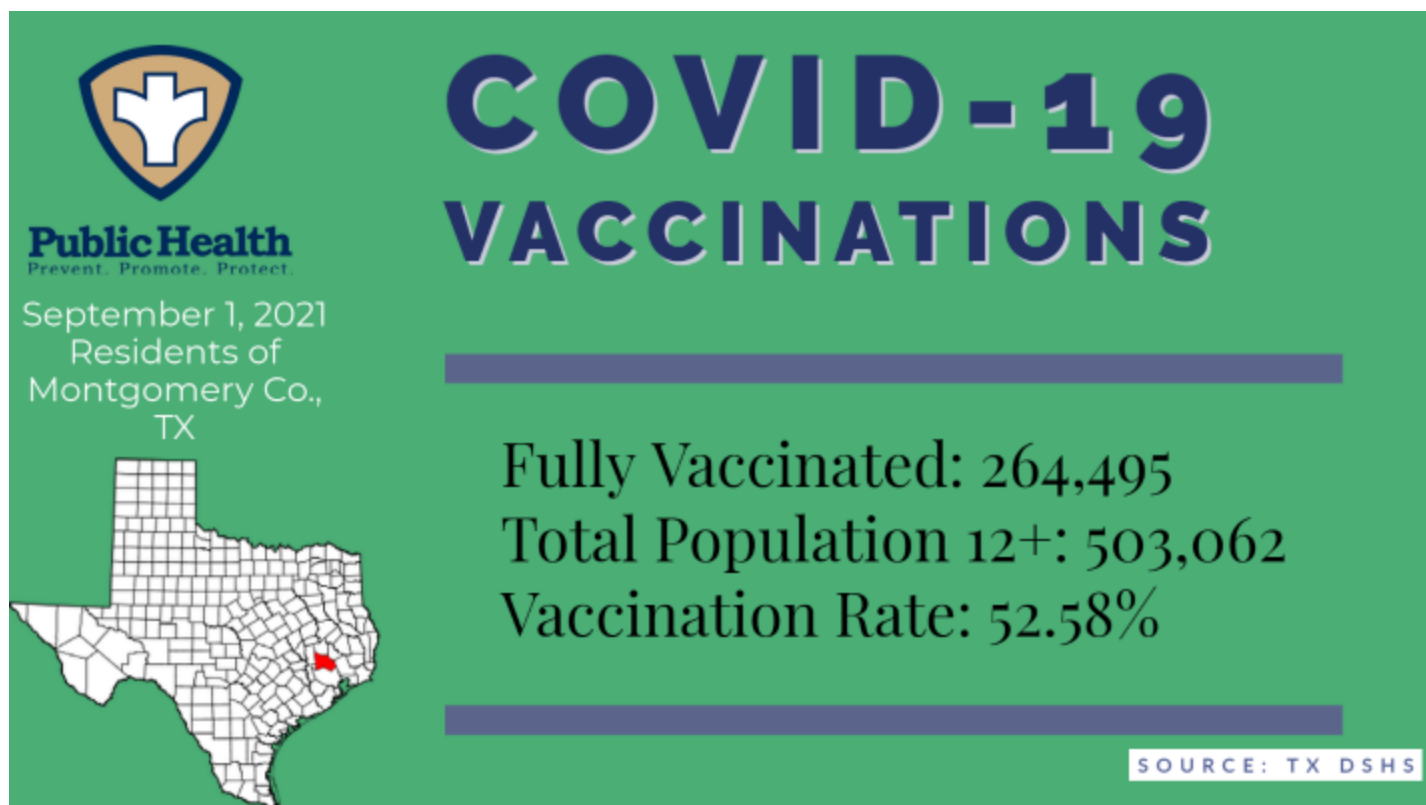


** This graph represents Total Hospital Census. In both graphs the green line "Total Hospital census" represents the total number of people in the hospital for that day. The blue line, represents total suspected COVID patients for that day. A suspected COVID patient is defined as a person who meets the criteria of COVID but has not yet received testing or test results. The red line "Confirmed COVID Cases" represents the number of Lab Confirmed patients currently General/Isolation Beds or ICU Beds. **All COVID related questions.**

Have you been vaccinated for COVID-19? We strongly recommend it. Even if you contract COVID-19 after vaccination, the chances of severe illness, hospitalization and death are low. Today, we can confirm two additional deaths related to COVID-19.

- A man in his 60s, from The Woodlands, died in the hospital. He had co-morbidities in addition to testing positive for COVID-19. He was not vaccinated.
- A man in his 80s, from Montgomery, died in the hospital. He had co-morbidities in addition to testing positive for COVID-19. He was fully vaccinated.

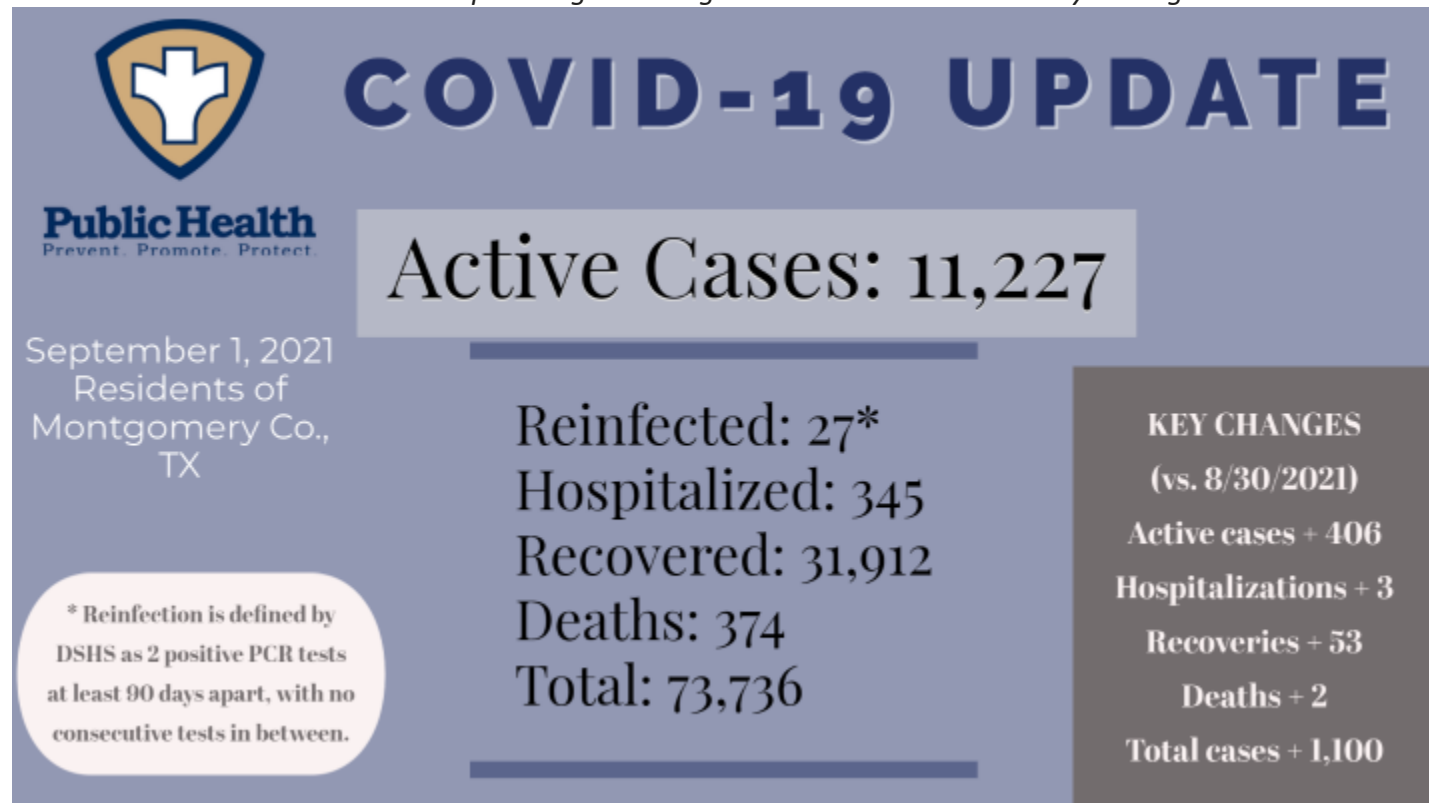
We can also confirm:

- TOTAL cases of COVID-19 increased by 1,100 to 73,736 since Monday's (8/30) report.
 - Of the 1,100 new cases, 206 are under the age of 12 and not eligible for vaccination.
- ACTIVE cases of COVID-19 increased by 406 to 11,227 since Monday's (8/30) report. This is an all-time high.
 - Today, we accounted for 639 additional inactive cases who we have been unable to contact for 30 days or more.
- 345 county residents are known, as a result of contact investigations, to be in the hospital. Contact investigations have not been initiated on all reported cases.
- 31,912 people have clinically recovered.

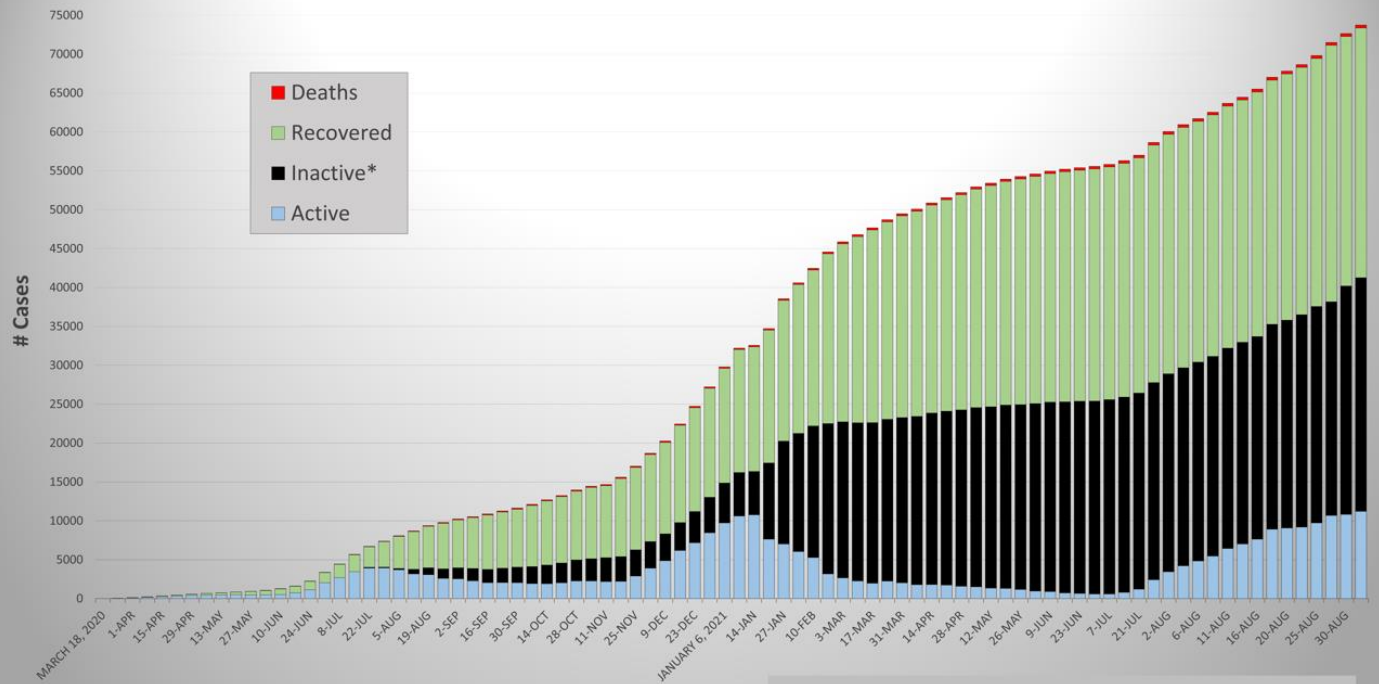
The Testing Positivity Rate for Montgomery County remains at 21%, down from 22% last Wednesday (8/25).
