LET'S TALK ABOUT HIV:

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention:

- An estimated 1.2 million people are living with HIV in the U.S
- Young people aged 13-24 accounted for 26% of all new HIV infections in 2010
- One in seven people in U.S. has HIV and does not know they are infected.

What is HIV? HIV stands for human immunodeficiency virus. It is the virus that can lead to acquired immunodeficiency syndrome, or AIDS. Unlike some other viruses, the human body cannot get rid of HIV. That means that once you have HIV, you have it for life. HIV affects specific cells of the immune system, called CD4 cells, or T cells. Over time, HIV can destroy so many of these cells that the body can't fight off infections and disease. When this happens, HIV infection leads to AIDS.

How is it transmitted?

- HIV can be transmitted during vaginal, anal or oral sex. HIV is transmitted by body fluids including blood, ejaculate, pre-ejaculate, female genital fluids (both vaginal and cervical fluid), breastmilk and anal mucous.
- HIV can also be transmitted by sharing needles, syringes, rinse water, or other equipment (works) used to prepare injection drugs with someone who has HIV

Who's at risk?

It is important to know risk factors are the same for everyone; however, HIV exposure is greater in those who have multiple sexual partners, have unprotected sex, substance abuse, and men who have sex with men.

- Do NOT have unprotected sex with strangers and always use a condom
 - Use a condom before any penetrative sexual activities, during vaginal, anal, and oral sex.
 - Use a condom every time you have sex or share sex toys.
 - Put a new condom on for each partner.

- Avoid having many sexual partners. If you have multiple sexual partners, get tested frequently
- Do NOT share needles, razors, or toothbrushes
- If you suspect you have been exposed to HIV contact a health care professional or go see you primary care provider
